

# NOTIFICATION

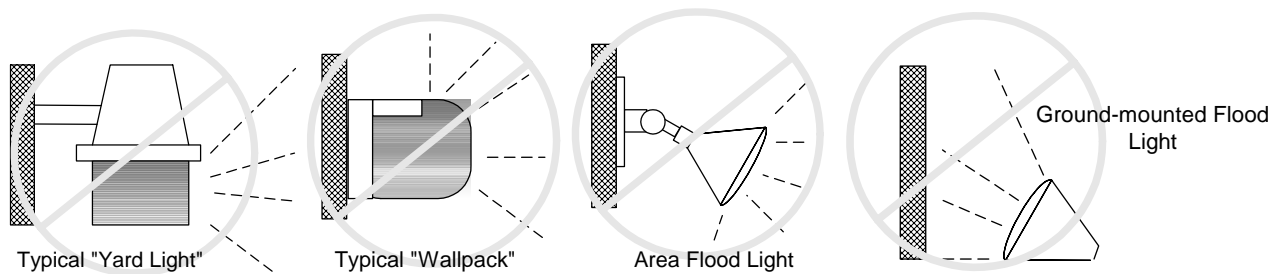
Neighbor, please be aware that the Kansas City International Airport General Planned Development District Ordinance has the following restriction on glare:

*“No direct or sky-reflected glare, whether from floodlights or from high-temperature processes such as combustion or welding or otherwise, so as to be objectionable at the points of measurement. All lights shall be so installed as to deflect from adjacent resident developments and streets.”*

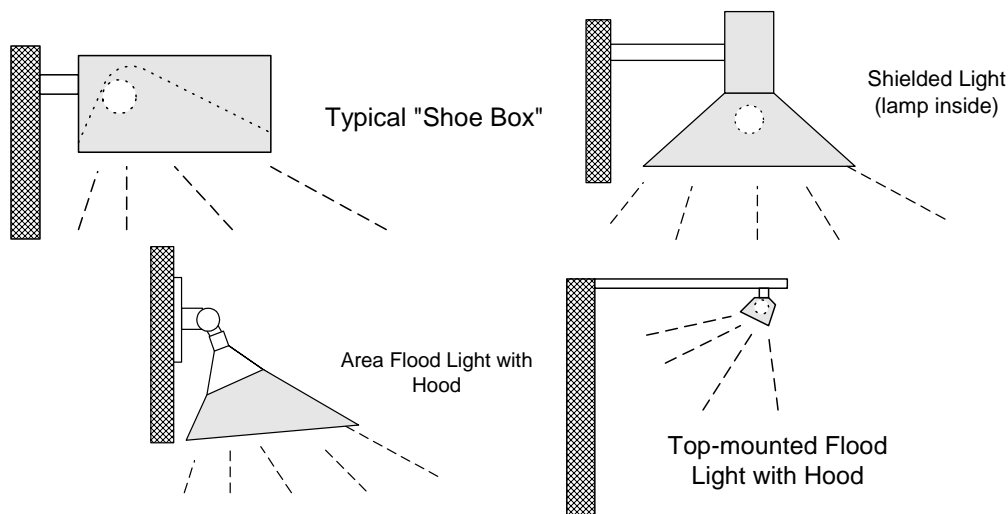
Please take a minute to review the lighting on your property. A good way to identify if your lights need to be modified is to determine if you can see the light source when it is turned on. You should be able to see the effect of lighting, not the source viewable from streets and residential properties. The light should also be restricted from pointing into the sky. At night, the fully adapted eye is sensitive enough to see a single candle 10 miles away, excessive glare severely limits our ability to see and drive.

The remedy of a problem might be as simple as modifying the direction a fixture is aimed. Consult your exterior lighting professional for additional details (make sure they are aware of this ordinance). Listed below are some common problems.
